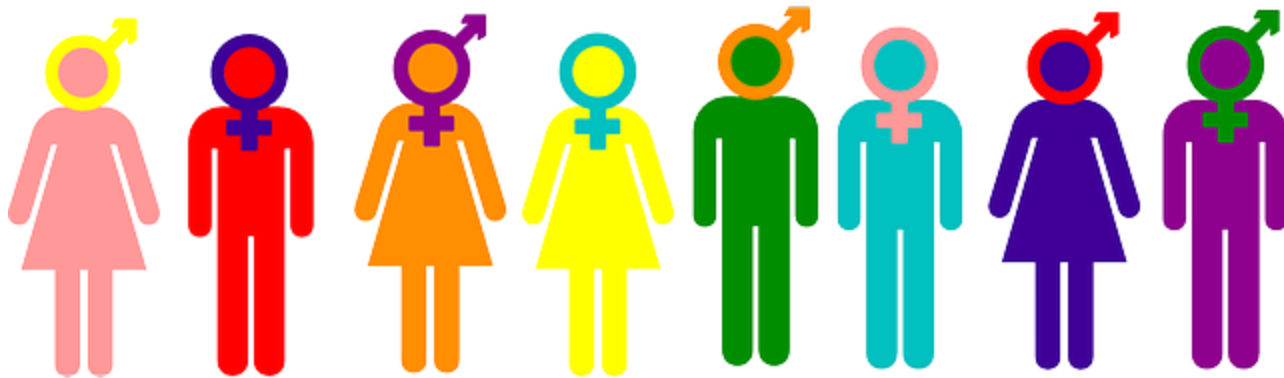


Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity



Lesson Objectives:

- To recognise and understand different terms relating to sexual orientation and gender.
- To understand that sexual orientation and gender identity are not the same.
- To raise awareness of the need for tolerance of different people, whatever their sexual orientation or gender identity.
- To understand to think carefully about the language we use.

What do these celebrities have in common?

Answer: They all identify as either lesbian, gay or bisexual

Derren Brown: ‘Came out’ to the Guardian newspaper in 2012 and says that he once tried to “train himself out of his homosexuality”, which made him very unhappy, so instead he learnt to embrace who he is

Sue Perkins: ‘Outed’ in 2002 by her ex-girlfriend Rhona Cameron who appeared on I’m a Celebrity Get Me Out of Here

Gareth Thomas: The most-capped Welsh rugby player, in 2010 he was voted the most influential gay man

Frank Ocean: Posted a blog on Tumblr about his first love, a man he met when he was 19, and said that sharing the story made him “feel like a free man”

Jodie Foster: Used her acceptance speech at the 2013 Golden Globe awards to thank her ex-partner Cydney Bernard

Megan Fox: Openly bisexual, she had several relationships with women before marrying her husband in 2010

Jim Parsons: Famous for playing Sheldon Cooper in The Big Bang Theory, he talked about being gay in an interview with the New York Times in 2012

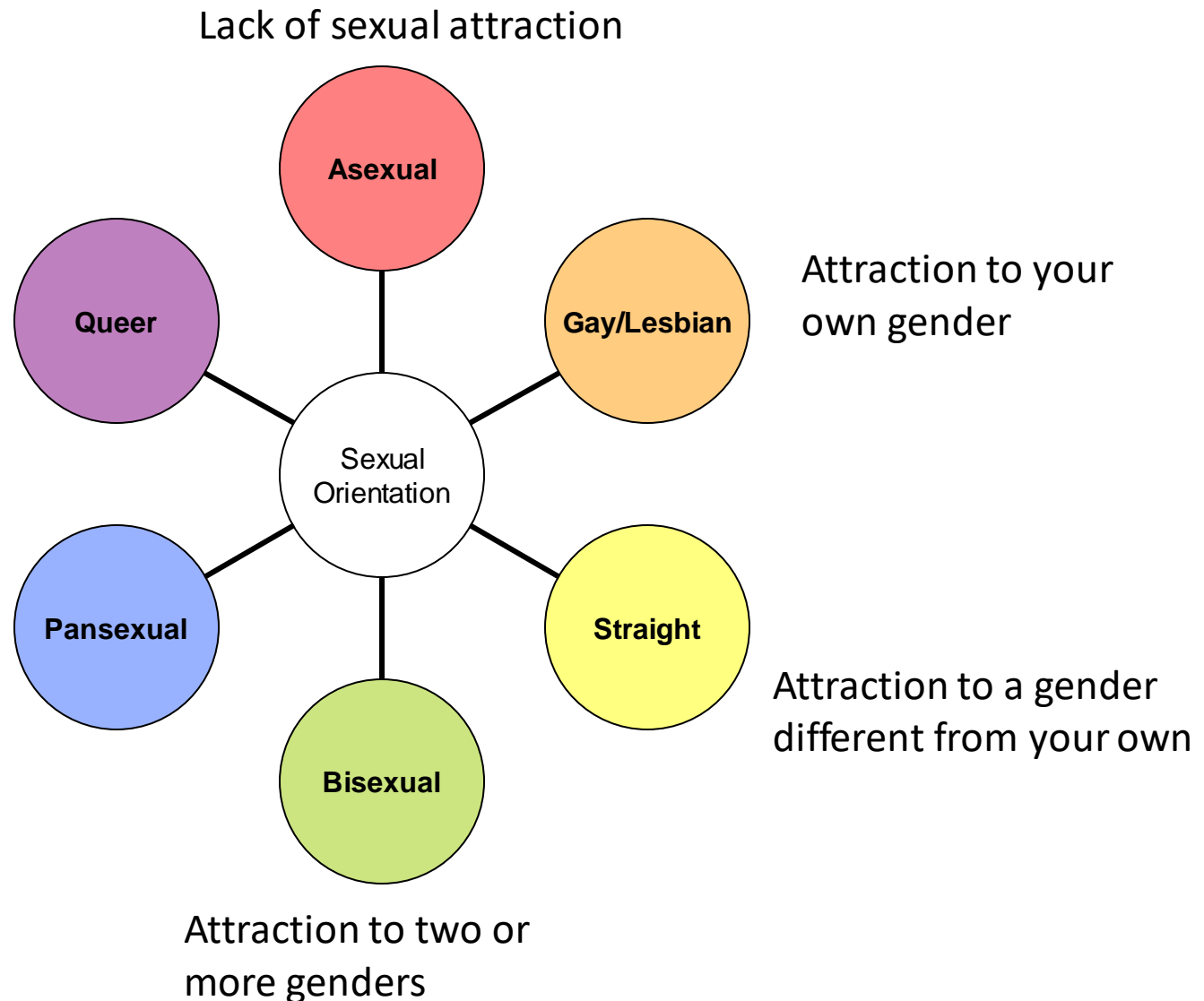
Neil Patrick Harris: Known for playing womaniser Barney Stinson in How I Met Your Mother, in 2006 he told the media he is “a very content gay man living life to the fullest”

How much do you know about sexuality?

Umbrella or stand alone term reclaimed by some LGBT+ people. Many people find it offensive and consider it a slur. If you are unsure if it's OK to use, don't use it.

It can also stand for Questioning.

Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Homophobia – hatred and fear of homosexuals

According to Stonewall, a charity which campaigns for gay rights:

- Almost two thirds of lesbian, gay and bisexual pupils experience homophobic bullying
- Young people who have been homophobically bullied are more likely to leave school at 16
- Seven out of ten gay pupils who experience homophobic bullying state that it has had an impact on their school work
- Half of those who have experienced homophobic bullying have skipped school at some point because of it

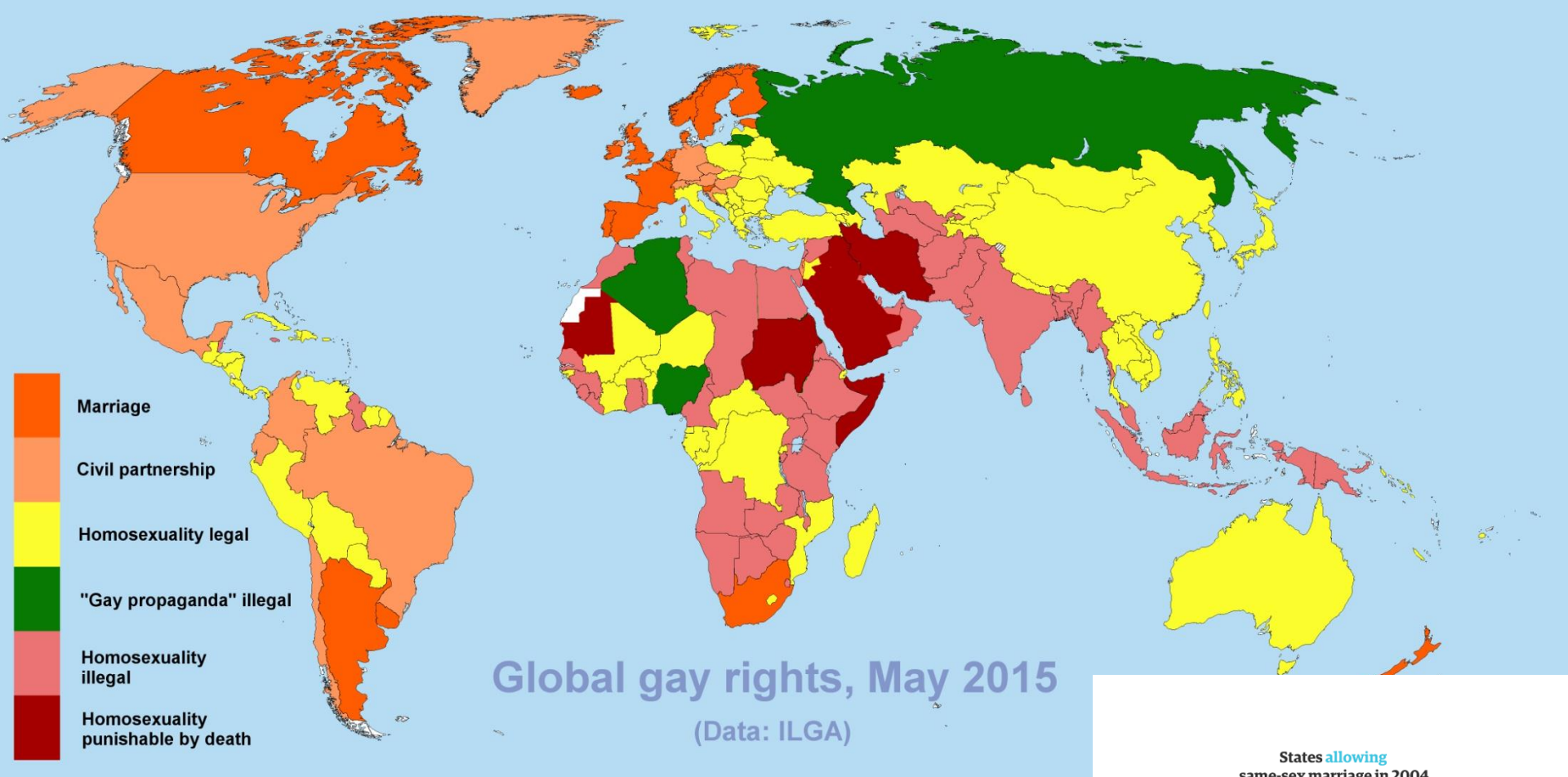
DISCUSSION: How do you think a gay young person might feel when they hear their friends use the phrase ‘that’s so gay’ to mean something negative or uncool?

Do you think using ‘gay’ as a negative word makes you homophobic? Why/why not?

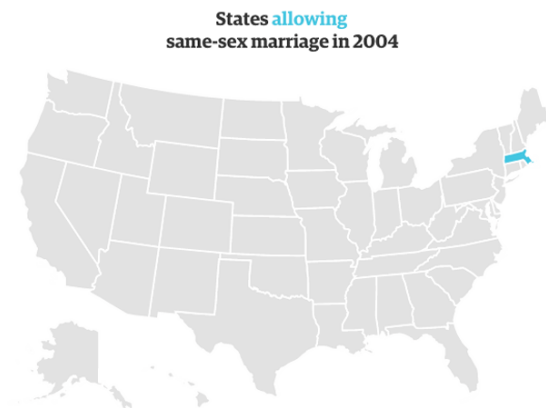

Gender

- Gender and sex are different things. Sex refers to anatomy while gender is a social category and refers to behavior and feelings.
- Your gender identity is your own perception of your gender and what label you choose to use. Gender expression is how you convey this, e.g. through clothing.
- Sometimes your gender and sex don't match up. This is why some people feel they were born into the wrong body.

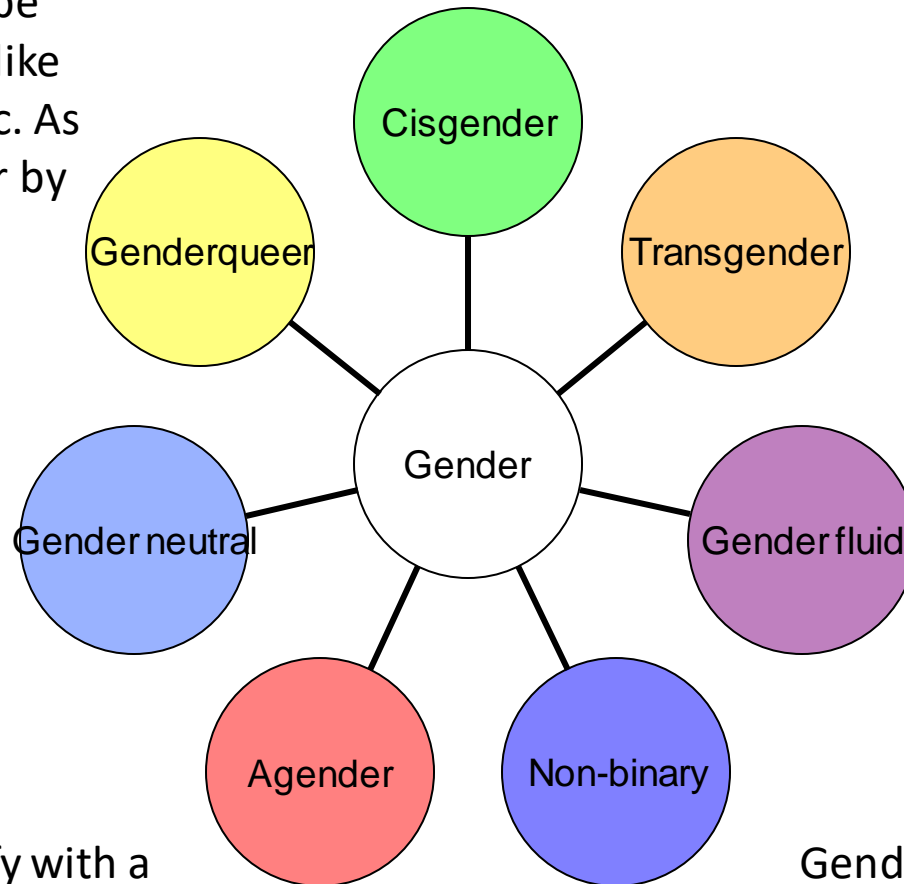
Gender terms

Gender identity, gender expression and sex match up

Umbrella term to describe non-normative genders like agender/gender fluid etc. As before, considered a slur by many.

Identities not easily categorized as masculine or feminine. Often a blend of the two.

Do not identify with a gender



Umbrella term-where sex, gender expression and gender identity do not match up

Gender identity changes or fluctuates

Gender outside the male/female binary

Approximately 2% of the population is transgender. Trans people do not identify as the gender they were assigned at birth.

“Trans” comes from Latin and means “across from”. (People who do identify as the gender they were assigned at birth are cisgender: “cis” also comes from Latin – it means “on the same side of”.)

Some transgender people take hormones or have surgery to make their body fit society’s ideals of their gender.

Stigmas and Discrimination - Examples

- Some people think asexual people are **broken** or **weird**.
- Bisexual people get stigmatized as **greedy** or liars and are extensively **under-represented** in the media.
- Gay is still used as a **derogatory** term.
- Transgender and non-binary people live in a strictly male/female world, e.g. the issue of **male/female toilets** or job applications which ask for your gender but only have two options.
- Sometimes these people are **refused access to benefits** reserved for people of their gender identity but not their assigned sex.
- People with identities that are not widely represented in the media are often told they **don't exist** or they are simply using a label **for attention**.
- These issues can lead to very serious consequences. It is now widely documented that LGBT+ people have a higher prevalence of mental health problems, as well as being more likely to self harm or attempt suicide.

WHAT TO DO

Research has shown that bullying (LGBT bullying in particular) can have harmful effect on the individual. Most of this bullying is due to young people being stigmatised. If you see someone being bullied...

1. Don't keep quiet- tell a teacher, no matter how silly it seems
2. Report every incident
3. Support the person being bullied
4. If you are worried about someone tell your tutor. They are there to help and will never reveal your name or what you have said unless it is a criminal or safeguarding matter.
