What would you most like to do in the future, that you haven't had chance to do yet?





CURRICULUM SPOTLIGHT

As parents, understanding the curriculum is crucial to support your child's learning and development. However, it can be challenging to keep up with what your child is learning and what the key areas of the curriculum are at each stage, leading to questions about assessment, content, and what constitutes a broad and balanced curriculum.

To help bridge this gap, we will regularly publish articles in our school newsletter that explain the curriculum and direct you to where you can find more information about your child's curriculum offer.

So, what do we mean by the curriculum?

Our curriculum is divided into three phases: lower years (7 and 8), middle years (9-11), and upper years (12 and 13). Each phase has many components including academic, pastoral, extracurricular, physical and mental health and social and emotional elements.

We aim to equip students with the knowledge, skills, and competencies they need to progress and thrive in the next phase of their education or training. To achieve this the curriculum is carefully planned and sequenced. As students progress, they become more scholarly by developing competency in knowledge and skills. They acquire a deeper understanding of the subject matter and the ability to apply that knowledge to solve problems and think critically. Additionally, they develop essential skills such as research, writing, and communication, which are vital for success in their chosen careers.

This progression prepares students for the challenges they will face in their future careers, including the demands of the workplace, engagement in lifelong learning, and making meaningful contributions to society.

Extracurricular clubs and activities offer students additional opportunities to develop skills that complement their academic pursuits. These activities help students build leadership skills, develop teamwork, make a positive contribution to their community, and expand their social networks. They can also allow students to pursue their interests, explore new areas of knowledge, and cultivate a passion for learning beyond the classroom.

Overall, the combination of academic progression and extracurricular engagement is our measure of a broad and balanced curriculum that prepares students for success in their future endeavours.

THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees are made up of a range of stakeholders who contribute a wide range of skills and experience and provide an independent viewpoint. All Trustees want to make a positive contribution to students' education and to ensure that the school is run to promote student achievement.

The Trustees are a corporate team and have three key functions. We work with the school's senior leadership team to:

- Ensure that the vision, ethos and strategic direction of the school are clearly defined;
- Ensure the sound, proper and effective use of the school's financial resources.

In addition, the Trustees will:

 Hold the Head Teacher to account for the educational performance of the school and its students and the appraisal of staff.

The running and management of the school is done by the Head Teacher and Senior Leadership Team. The Board's role is to provide effective challenge and support to the Head Teacher and Senior Leadership team to ensure excellence in all areas of DHSG.

The Board of Trustees consists of the Head Teacher together with a number of other trustees, some elected from the parent body.

The Board is led by a Chair and Vice Chair. Trustees come from a wide range of backgrounds and are chosen to ensure a balance of skills across the Board. Trustees are generally in post for four years with the option to be reappointed for a further four years with a cap of eight years' service in total. The combination of experienced trustees and new recruits ensures both continuity and a fresh approach.

The Trustees meet once a month in which the strategic work of the Board takes place.

SPARX UPDATES



At DHSG, students are now using Sparx for their Maths, English (called Sparx Reader) and Science homeworks. Sparx is a digital platform which enables students to revise and work on their subjects, as part of a homework package. 1000s of schools and their students take part in this and each week we receive the leaderboard for each of the subjects, in terms of performance. DHSG students constantly top this leaderboard which is very impressive! We have recently started using Sparx Science, this academic year.

Last year, DHSG was one of the top performing schools for Sparx Reader and Sparx Maths for the academic year 2022-2023.

For Sparx Reader, we have won the gold award for highest achiever; the gold award for greatest progress and the bronze award for most SRP collected.

For Sparx Maths, we have won the gold award for highest achiever.

Additionally, DHSG was one of the top performing schools across all Sparx Learning systems, winning gold for highest achiever.

Receiving a gold award requires being within the top 5 schools using Sparx Learning systems, silver requires being within the top 10 and bronze requires being within the top 15.

We would like to say a huge well done and congratulations to our students for their dedication to their learning and progress across Sparx Maths and Sparx Reader.



The Science Department has been very busy this academic year providing many opportunities for enrichment, cross-curricular work and stretch and challenge for our students.

September

Science in the holiday transition project.

We welcomed another new cohort into DHSG and were completely blown away by their transition science work. There was huge participation in this activity and both the quality and creativity was impressive; ranging from a model brain, a study of fungi, solar system models, a project on the Periodic Table, models and explanations of the life cycles of caterpillars and a model of the hydrological cycle, to name but a few!

Our first extracurricular activity took place in September, with Yr8 students taking part in the IET Faraday© Challenge Day. We were the first school this academic year to take part in the challenge and so the details were secret until the end of the competition. The students were given the opportunity to research, design and make prototype solutions for real-life engineering problems and to learn about careers in STEM. The teams raced against the clock to solve a problem, putting their engineering and technology skills to the test.

Fifteen Yr12 Physicists and Mr Moore attended a training day hosted at Kingsbridge College by the Royal Institution (rigb.org). The Royal Institution are famously known for their Christmas lectures and work to promote science and science education worldwide. The aim was to train students to develop a series of lessons for primary school children to further promote liaisons between DHSG and primary schools, as well as teaching younger students about Physics and Maths. Students had a fantastic experience and were fully engaged and inspired to think imaginatively about their subject, jumping on the opportunity to exercise their creativity

"I really enjoyed building my teaching skills and learning how to share things that I am passionate about. I am looking forward to the summer and helping to enthuse primary children about Physics."

Biology week was celebrated via an inspirational assembly delivered by Mr Thomas to celebrate the remarkable life and



work of Primatologist Dame Jane Goodall. The overarching message from this was a powerful one, "Have dreams, be curious, and be passionate about something." Mr Thomas challenged all of us to channel our passion and curiosity to make a positive impact on the world and for those who already have a passion to deepen their knowledge and commitment.

Mr Moore was proud to share the success of Lowenna in Yr12 who formally received her Arkwright Engineering Scholarship the Headquarters of the Institute of Engineering and Technology at Savoy Place London. Lowenna's application went through a rigorous process with various stages, including a formal interview whilst taking her GCSE'S in June. She had to present a concept design of which she impressed the judges with a one-handed apple core implement for people with limited strength. Lowenna firstly generated many designs on paper, considering the initial purpose of the implement, she then considered its mechanics and practical forces, before generating a working design

after mastering a 3D CAD software package. Lowenna was also fortunate to attract sponsorship from a specialist 3D printing company to produce a working prototype.

Nationally there were just 328 Arkwright Engineering Scholarships awarded this year, of which 121 were presented to girls. The awards strive to break down the barriers and misconceptions preventing young people, particularly girls and students from underrepresented groups, from engaging with engineering, by providing them with the confidence, skills, and real-world learning to thrive in STEM. Lowenna will now receive mentoring from an engineering company and have the opportunity to attend national lectures and events whilst studying her A levels at DHSG.

"There were three parts of the Arkwright application, for the first I designed with a CAD software and constructed a singlehanded apple cutter, getting the parts generously 3D printed by Xometry UK, Chelmsford as a sponsorship. The second was an aptitude test in which certain



problems were posed and we were tasked with designing and displaying our solutions in a set amount of time – definitely the hardest part of the application. The third and final was an interview with Arkwright and Smallpeice Trust representatives. Once I found out I got the award in mid-September, I looked forward to the ceremony in London and a number of opportunities to find out more about engineering career possibilities – with the help of a provided mentor – and meet people in the industry. As well as experience and connections – like one I'm hopefully attending at Cambridge University in the new year. The award also provides a monetary prize which can be spent on many enriching events and equipment, to help my A-level studies."



Mr Prideaux ran an Invertebrates in Autumn photography competition and we had some wonderful entries from Yr7 all the way up to sixth form and staff. It was great to see how engaged the students were and it reinforced how, given the opportunity, our students will go above and beyond. He also took our students on a Moss Safari. 18 enthusiastic young biologists delved into the microscopic world to discover the wonders of moss! They enthusiastically hunted for the 'big 5' which included nematodes, moss mites, rotifers, gastotrichs and the ever-elusive tardigrade. This event was such a success that we needed to put on a second date!







Chemistry week was celebrated with a virtual presentation from Mrs Pierce about careers in Chemistry to tutor groups and the vast array of opportunities open to our students and links to the Royal Society of Chemistry careers game. Middle school and Upper school students had some thought and maybe provoking eye-opening career opportunities shared via their year group Team, to inspire them about where a qualification in Chemistry could lead and different routes into them. The big screen in reception was also full of inspirational women working in Chemistry today. She also shared our annual firework and bonfire safety message alongside some chemistry, so that everyone could enjoy a safe and informed evening. We also held an open lab for students and staff to carry out some flame testing of their own and to see the rainbow flames demonstration.








"I very much enjoyed reliving elements of my A-Level Chemistry and trying to remember what colour each flame would be."

The Chemistry department also facilitated Yr12 students attending a Chemistry Meet and Greet: Placements and Future Employers event hosted at the University of Plymouth in conjunction with the Royal Society of Chemistry. A number of our students attended this event that was a great opportunity for them to find out about careers in chemistry over pizza and to connect with potential employers at the beginning of their academic journey. There was a mixture of insightful presentations, glimpses into industry-based placements and networking.



"I really liked learning about the different research projects companies were working on. It made me realise a small group of people could create something that can affect so many people positively. It was really worth going to."

Towards the end of the month, the Chemistry Department also entered the Regional Top of the Bench competition in conjunction with the Royal Society of Chemistry and the University of Plymouth. The competition involves a Team consisting of two Yr9 students, one Yr10 and one Yr11 student working collaboratively on a variety of Chemistry challenges and engaging with a remote practical investigation: Laboratory based spectrophotometric determination of nitrate in river water. This was an undergraduate level practical that involves fieldwork and provided an introduction into the practical skills and approach required by environmental analytical scientists to measure and assess environmentally important ions in river water using relevant instrumental methods of analysis and to assess the environmental significance. Our Team consisting of Lulu, Evie, Beatrice, and Lily did incredibly well in the regional final, a fantastic achievement and we are incredibly proud of them.



Five Yr12 students have signed up to the ongoing Dirt is Good, peer coaching project run by Dr Little and attended their online training delivered by Future Foundations, to become DHSG changemakers and continue the good work of previous years. This is a global programme encouraging Yr12 students to coach younger years in delivering a social or environmental project. They are have already started applying coaching skills to guide Green Team through the Woodland Trust's Green Tree Award. They helped produce an assembly for National Tree Week which was delivered virtually and seen by over 400 students.

"The programme is about developing our skills as young leaders whilst encouraging sustainability within our school. We have hopes to either: plant more trees on site to make our school greener, create a bug hotel + more wildflower planting within the school or work with gardening club to evolve the ecology area."





National Tree Week was celebrated by Dr Little and the Green Team, who continued with their work towards gaining the Bronze Woodland Trust's Green Tree School Award, a prestigious award where schools are rewarded for doing environmental projects, such as tree planting, reducing carbon dioxide emissions and recycling, all of which DHSG are committed to. They shared a virtual whole school assembly to enthuse everyone about trees and how important they are. Dr Parry monitors our fuel bills and is delighted to share that the school has saved approximately 13000kg of CO2, that's approximately 3 hot air balloons worth! We are in the process of collating the final evidence for the Bronze level Green Tree award and will be working on future sustainability campaigns to progress to the next level!


